CHAPTER 1

1 Now the word of the LORD came to Jonah the son of Amitai, saying,
 2 "Arise, go to Nineveh the great city and proclaim against it, for¹ their wickedness has come up before me."
 3 But Jonah rose up to flee to Tarshish from the presence of the LORD. So he went down [to] Joppa and found a ship going [to] Tarshish. And he paid its fare and went down into it to go with them to Tarshish, away from the presence of the LORD.
 4 But the LORD hurled a great wind upon the sea, and there was a great storm on the sea with the result that the ship threatened² to break up.
 5 Then the sailors became afraid and cried out, each man to his god. And they hurled the articles which [were] in the ship into the sea in order to lighten [the load] from upon them. Now Jonah had gone down into the innermost parts of the ship and had lain down and had fallen into a deep sleep.
 6 So the chief of the sailors drew near to him and said to him, "What [are] you doing sleeping deeply? Arise, call upon your God; perhaps God will think about us, with the result that we will not perish."
 7 And they said, each man to his companion, "Come, and let us cast lots in order that we may know on whose account this calamity [has come] upon us." So they cast lots, and the lot fell upon Jonah.
 8 Then they said to him, "Tell us now on whose account this calamity [has come] upon us. What is your occupation? And where do you come from? What [is] your country? And from what people [are] you?"
 9 And he said to them, "I [am] a Hebrew, and I fear the LORD the God of heaven, who made the sea and the dry land."
 10 Then the men feared [with] a great fear and said to him, "What [is] this you have done?" For the men knew that he was fleeing from the presence of the LORD, because he had told them.
 11 And they said to him, "What should we do to you, in order that the sea may grow silent for us." For the sea was growing more and more stormy.
 12 And he said to them, "Take me up and hurl me into the sea, then the sea will grow silent for you. For I know that on account of me this great storm [has come] upon you."
 13 Nevertheless the men rowed to bring [it] back to the dry land, but they were not able, for the sea was growing more and more stormy upon them.
 14 Then they cried out to the LORD and said, "We implore you, O LORD, please let us not perish on account of the life of this man, and do not lay upon us innocent blood, for you, O LORD, have done as you have delighted."
 15 Therefore they took up Jonah and hurled [him] into the sea, and the sea stood still from its raging.
 16 Then the men feared the LORD [with] a great fear, and they sacrificed a sacrifice to the LORD and vowed [with] vows.
 17 And the Lord appointed a great fish to swallow up Jonah. And Jonah was in the belly of the fish [for] three days and three nights.

 4 And Jonah began to go into the city [for] a journey of a day. Then he cried out and said, "Forty days more, and Nineveh will be overthrown."
 5 Then the men of Nineveh believed in God. And they proclaimed a fast and put on sackcloth, from the greatest of them to the least of them.
 6 And the word reached the king of Nineveh. Then he rose up from his throne, and took away his robe from upon him, and covered himself [with] sackcloth, and sat upon the ashes.
 7 And he made a proclamation and gave orders in Nineveh by the decree of the king and his nobles, saying, "Let no man or beast, cattle or flock, taste anything; let them not graze and let them not drink water.
 8 But rather let man and beast cover themselves [with] sackcloth, and let them cry out to God with force, and let them turn back, each man from his evil way and from the violence which [is] in their hands.
 9 "Who knows? God may turn back and feel regret and turn back from the burning of his anger, with the result that we do² not perish."
 10 And God saw their deeds, that they turned back from their evil way. And God regretted the calamity which he had said [he] would bring upon them, and did not do [it].

CHAPTER 4

1 But it was displeasing to Jonah [with] great displeasure, and he burned with anger.
 2 And he prayed to the LORD and said, "I implore you, O LORD, was not this my saying while I was in my land? Therefore I set out in advance to flee to Tarshish. For I know that you [are] a gracious and compassionate God, slow to¹ anger and abundant in lovingkindness, and one who regrets calamity.
 3 "Now therefore, O LORD, take now my life away from me, for [it is] better for me to die than for me to live²."
 4 And the LORD said, "Do you do well to burn with anger³?"
 5 Then Jonah went out from the city and sat on [the] east of the city. And he made a booth for himself there and sat under it in the shade until he saw what would happen in the city.
 6 And the LORD God appointed a castor oil plant and made [it] go⁴ up over Jonah to be a shade over his head, to deliver him from his displeasure. And Jonah rejoiced [with] great joy on account of the castor oil plant.
 7 Then God appointed a worm when the dawn came up on the next day, and it struck the castor oil plant, and it withered.
 8 And it happened as soon as the sun rose, that God appointed a scorching east wind⁵, and the sun beat upon the head of Jonah, and he became faint. Then he requested that he should⁶ die and said, "[It is] better for me to die than for me to live⁷."
 9 And God said to Jonah, "Do you do well to burn with anger⁸ concerning the castor oil plant?" And he said, "I do well to burn with anger⁹ even to death."
 10 Then the LORD said, "You looked compassionately upon the castor oil plant, on which you did not labor and [which] you did not cause to grow, which came into being [in] a night and perished [in] a night.
 11 "And should I not look compassionately upon Nineveh the great city, in which there are more than a hundred and twenty thousand men who do not distinguish between their right [hand] and their left [hand], and much cattle?"

 5 So Jonah went out of the city, and sat on the east side of the city, and there made him a booth, and sat under it in the shadow, till he might see what would become of the city.
 6 And the LORD God prepared a gourd, and made *it* to come up over Jonah, that it might be a shadow over his head, to deliver him from his grief. So Jonah was exceeding glad of the gourd.
 7 But God prepared a worm when the morning rose the next day, and it smote the gourd that it withered.
 8 And it came to pass, when the sun did arise, that God prepared a vehement east wind; and the sun beat upon the head of Jonah, that he fainted, and wished in himself to die, and said, *It is better* for me to die than to live.
 9 And God said to Jonah, Doest thou well to be angry for the gourd? And he said, I do well to be angry, *even* unto death.
